

Now in its 20th year, this is the ace of animation compilation shows, prized by fans, students, and industry professionals. It is curated by animation expert and producer Ron Diamond, who has scouted 38 eventual Oscar nominees and 11 winners among the many prizewinners culled from around the globe.

This year's crop of 15 films from 6 nations includes: **THE GREEN BIRD**, French gag-fest about a nervous bird's frantic efforts to protect her unhatched offspring; **ONE SMALL STEP**, the touching tale of a girl's dream to become an astronaut; **GRANDS CANONS**, a rapid-fire survey of the vast inanimate domain of tools, implements, and instruments; **FLOWER FOUND!**, a provocative Dutch fable of barnyard injustice; **AGE OF SAIL**, the sweeping saga of a misanthropic sailor who reluctantly rescues a teenaged girl; **MY MOON**, a spectacularly visualized fantasy of a celestial love triangle; **WEEKENDS**, the dreams and realities of an imaginative boy shuttled between his divorced parents.

(UNGA ASTRID) 2018, Pernille Fischer Christensen, Sweden/Denmark, 124 min. With Alba August, Henrik Rafaelsen

The 1920s coming of age of a Swedish girl who would become the creator of the beloved Pippi Longstocking books is the focus of this arresting biopic. As a naive intern at her hometown newspaper, brightly curious Astrid (August) falls in love with the married editor. Pregnancy and shame follow, with Astrid's dreams seemingly dashed in the face of the hardship and struggle that will forge her into a woman whose imagination is her salvation. Featuring a brilliant pulp script and a hair-raising femme fatale, DETOUR is deservedly a legend among connoisseurs of B-movies, film noir, and Poverty Row auteur Ulmer. Long available only in scruffy, scratchy prints, this great film is reborn through a great restoration, whose pristine, richly textured quality seems startling, even magical. (FELIZ AND TIJUANA) 2018, Andrew van Baal, Mexico/USA, 73 min. With Luis Deveze, Kristine Veta

The reckless air of a border town gives extra flavor to a Mexican New Year's Eve when a missed flight strands the cautious middle-aged professor Alejandro (Deveze) in Tijuana. After an unexpected encounter with pretty former student Ana (Veta), he joins a party of reveling academics. It's the first course in an evening laced with comic undertones that will evolve into a tangled odyssey of new sights, new emotions, and a dangerous attraction. In Spanish with English subtitles. Baltimore's rough inner city, where gunfire and violent death are everyday occurrences, is the setting for this searing documentary. CHARM CITY follows the street-level path of Mr. C, a grizzled activist who operates a homemade community center; Monique, a veteran cop from the neighborhood; and Brandon Scott, a young black council member with grassroots ideas. Filming over three years, director Ness finds pathos, empathy, and a resolve to persevere in an embattled city. DCP digital. (BS)


FREE SOLO

2018, Elizabeth Chai Vasarhelyi and Jimmy Chin, USA, 100 min.

A thriller like no other, this edge-of-your-seat documentary follows rock-climber Alex Honnold's quest to scale Yosemite National Park's El Capitan without ropes, cleats, or gear of any kind. What drives this single-minded 30-year-old loner, who lives for climbing and is seemingly incapable of fear, is the film's fascinating subtext, as Honnold makes tentative steps to maintain a relationship with a woman, impatiently recovers from injuries, and has his brain scanned for genetic abnormalities. They don't make politicians like Daniel Patrick Moynihan anymore, although we could certainly use someone like the man who said, "People are entitled to their own opinions but not to their own facts." Moynihan wore many hats—technocrat, author, Harvard professor, adviser to presidents, U.N. Ambassador, U.S. Senator—but this lively documentary is more than a resumé. It gets to the heart of a complex, unclassifiable public servant: flamboyant yet thoughtful, effectively pragmatic without abandoning his New Deal-bred principles. DCP digital. (MR)

This year's most deliciously offbeat and unpredictable film is a contemporary fable that messes with the mind on the darker side of folklore. Tina (Melander), a customs agent with an instinct for detecting smugglers, detains a suspicious man whose stubby, hulking physique matches her own. Based on a story by John Ajvide Lindquist (*Let the Right One In*), BORDER unfolds as an investigative mystery, bizarre romance, and revenge drama traversing the border between real and surreal. 
(DER HIMMEL ÜBER BERLIN) 1987, Wim Wenders, Germany, 128 min. With Bruno Ganz, Solveig Dommartin, Peter Falk

In Wenders's stunning mixture of fantasy and neorealism, the trench-coated angel Damiel (Ganz) moves invisibly through still-divided Berlin, reading people's innermost thoughts but remaining excluded from their world of flesh, color, and mortality. Hampered by technical limitations when the film was made, Wenders considers this new 4K DCP digital restoration a truer rendition of the original image and sound. (aka ANDREI ROUBLEV) 1966, Andrei Tarkovsky, USSR, 183 min. With Anatoliy Solonitsin, Nikolay Burlyaev

Tarkovsky's breakthrough film is loosely centered on the revered 15th-century Russian monk and icon painter. Wandering through a world filled with cruelty and tormented by his own wavering faith, Rublev retreats into silence, until he encounters a seemingly miraculous event. From the dizzying balloon flight that opens the film to the construction of a gigantic bell that climaxes it, Tarkovsky fills the screen with densely layered images of breathtaking beauty and power. GREASER'S PALACE


1972, Robert Downey Sr., USA, 91 min. With Allan Arbus, Albert Henderson

A religious parable, wrapped in an absurdist comedy, inside a revisionist western, GREASER'S PALACE parachutes a zoot-suited stranger named Jesse (Arbus) into the Wild West domain of the kingpin Mr. Greaser (Henderson). Jesse amazes the locals with his ability to raise the dead, although he'd rather be celebrated for his singing and dancing. 35mm. (MR)

F FOR FAKE (1973)

series, Orson Welles: The Other Side of the Argument, beginning January 25, with weekly Tuesday lectures by Jonathan Rosenbaum, internationally renowned film critic and author of numerous books including Discovering Orson Welles and Cinematic Encounters: Interviews and Dialogues. This series is a polemical defense and celebration of Orson Welles's films that seeks to counter some of the ideological and biographical biases in the U.S. that view him as an out-of-control and unfulfilled artist.



From November 3 to January 2, the Gene Siskel Film Center, in partnership with Luce Cinecittà and the Italian Cultural Institute, Chicago, presents *Visconti*, a nine-film series devoted to the great Italian director who combined visual splendor with vivid characterizations and a tragic sense of social-historical change. Visconti's first films, OSSESSIONE (1943) and LA TERRA TREMA (1948), are considered foundational works of the Italian neorealist movement, but he confounded (and, at first, alienated) critics by moving in a markedly different direction: sumptuous, sensual, baroque, literary, melodramatic, operatic. Visconti's sweeping style and fanatical attention to detail make his films big-screen musts. Visconti was organized by Camilla Cormanni and Paola Ruggiero of Luce Cinecittà and is sponsored by the Italian Cultural Institute, Chicago. WHITE NIGHTS

(LE NOTTI BIANCHE) 1957, Luchino Visconti, Italy, 97 min. With Marcello Mastroianni, Maria Schell, Jean Marais

Sunday, December 2, 5:00 pm Tuesday, December 4, 6:00 pm

WHITE NIGHTS represents Visconti's furthest departure from his neorealist roots. The film is based on the 1848 Dostoyevsky short story of a lonely man (Mastroianni) who becomes involved with a woman (Schell) awaiting the uncertain return of her beloved (Marais). Filming entirely on elaborate sets in the Cinecittà studio, the director creates a Gothic fairyland of inky canals, narrow alleys, neon signs, and crumbling ruins. THE LEOPARD

(IL GATTOPARDO) 1963, Luchino Visconti, Italy, 185 min. With Burt Lancaster, Alain Delon, Claudia Cardinale

Saturday, December 8, 7:00 pm Sunday, December 9, 2:00 pm Wednesday, December 12, 6:30 pm

Visconti's widescreen masterpiece is one of the cinema's richest visual experiences. Based on Tomasi di Lampedusa's classic novel, it tells of an aging but still vigorous Sicilian prince (Lancaster) whose sympathies for Garibaldi's revolution conflict with the interests of his own declining class. The climactic grand ball is a tour de force of densely orchestrated detail. In Italian with English subtitles. DCP digital. <u>Note: There</u> *will be a 15-minute intermission.* (MR)







New restoration! SENSO

1954, Luchino Visconti, Italy, 123 min. With Alida Valli, Farley Granger

A key film in the director's career and in the history of Italian cinema, SENSO, with its lavish Technicolor style and theme of aristocratic decline, set the stage for THE LEOPARD and other late Visconti works. Fassbinder and Scorsese were both greatly influenced by this operatic tale, set in 1866 Venice, of a beautiful Italian countess's destructive passion for an arrogant officer in the occupying Austrian army. ROCCO AND HIS BROTHERS

(ROCCO E I SUOI FRATELLI) 1960, Luchino Visconti, Italy, 177 min. With Alain Delon, Renato Salvatori, Annie Girardot

Sunday, December 23, 2:00 pm Wednesday, December 26, 6:30 pm

In this vivid and violent family saga, the five brothers of a peasant clan are traced from their beginnings in grinding rural poverty to the flowering of their rivalries and ambitions in working-class Milan. Through the changing fortunes of one family, Visconti charts the societal changes that swept a generation from the fields of their ancestors to the cold concrete of the 20th-century city. LUDWIG

1972, Luchino Visconti, Italy, 238 min. With Helmut Berger, Romy Schneider

No Visconti film has more sharply divided critics than this sumptuous biography of the mad Bavarian king, many of whose tastes (opera, lavish decor, male beauty) reflect Visconti's own. Major episodes include Ludwig's patronage of opportunistic Richard Wagner (Trevor Howard) and his platonic love affair with Empress Elizabeth of Austria (Schneider).
